The Parish Letter

For most people, Christmas is long forgotten by the time February arrives – decorations were taken down, boxed up, and put into the attic shortly after Christmas. So, on a recent Zoom call, I was very surprised to see some Christmas decorations still up in someone's room. "It's the middle of January – are those Christmas decorations?" I said, to which she replied "Yes, and they'll stay up until the 2nd February. After all, the Kings have only just arrived!" The explanation is that she grew up in Germany, where the season of Christmas continues until Candlemas which is on the 2nd February.

Celebrating Candlemas as the end of Christmas is reflected in our annual Candlemas services, but there is a much stronger tradition in many European countries, with processions through the town to the church, young people wearing real candles on headdresses. When they arrive in the church and the candles are blown out, they are left with a rather desolate feeling of the light fading away as the Christmas season is finally over.

The candles not only represent Jesus as the Light of the World, they are also a symbol of light in the dark days of winter. And the days seem to have been particularly dark this year. Lots of people have found it very hard to cope with endless grey, sunless days. Add to that the general disappointment that Covid is still very much with us, it's not been an easy time. Many people had a far from normal Christmas, with Covid outbreaks disrupting family gatherings, and themselves maybe in bed with a high temperature on the day.

There are some people, a cousin of mine amongst them, who regularly suffer from a condition called SAD – Seasonal Affective Disorder. One sufferer says "December is dark but the festive lights and cheerfulness are an antidote and I now put up my Christmas decorations really early (1st Dec) as a way of coping with my SAD symptoms. However, when all the festive cheer has gone, I find January and February really tough." If you're feeling a bit low, you are not alone. Jesus spent his life helping people who were a bit low – telling them about God's love and changing their lives.

And he gave us a simple rule for a better life, or rather two rules, in his short phrase – "Love your neighbour as yourself." We need to learn to love ourselves, to be kind to ourselves, to accept ourselves. If we feel like opting out for a bit, opt out, have a quiet day at home. Light a candle. Quietly pray. Try being peaceful.



The Candlemas celebration, as it survives, makes perfect sense with what was written in the bible. In Tudor times, the snowdrop plants had many Catholic names given by the medieval monks who had brought the bulbs from their homelands in Italy.

Later, in Victorian England, a new cult of virginity and chastity thrived in Britain. Set up by a Christian philanthropist called Ellice Hopkins. Ellice set up groups called 'snowdrop bands'. There is also long history of snowdrops being used for medicinal purposes. That's another two stories!

Today snowdrops are everywhere in the countryside, especially in Devon.

They are also very common in church yards and cemeteries. (Unfortunately, a custom of planting in graveyards might have led to a Common name for Snowdrops: "Death Flowers". Victorians said the drooping head of the flowers resembled shrouds and had a saying that "they grow closer to the dead than the living!")

Of the 15,000 to 20,000 snowdrops in full bloom from mid-February to mid-March at St. Raphael's, are welcome to simply observe the beauty of this tiny flower as a symbol of Spring and hope for 2022.

Snowdrop prayers

Every year I love it when I see snowdrops appear.

I love their fragile beauty, intricate petals and flimsy stems buffeted by Winter winds.

I love their tenacity at arriving while snow still threatens.



While other bulbs keep warm below ground waiting for Spring sunshine, their scattering of white brings life to my otherwise drab garden.

They tell me: hang on, there. Spring is coming!

This year in 2022, they remind me to thank God for the answers He gave to those prayers, and to keep praying for 'Spring' to come.

What fragile things could you pray for? If you can find some snowdrops, take some photos and use them to inspire your prayers.



Our famous philatelist?!

Many of you will be familiar with the large carved wooden screen standing at the western

end of the north aisle in St Pancras Church. You may also be aware of the dedication inscribed on the screen reading

"In loving memory of Kathleen Penn-Gaskell died 12 November 1915 and her son Percy Charles Penn-Gaskell died 20th February 1937".

The screen was presented to the Church by Kathleen's daughter and Percy's sister, Winifred Ethel Penn-Gaskell and had originally been



located at Scorbitor farm. A property formally used as a sanctuary by senior clergy of the Exeter diocese.

Winifred Penn-Gaskell was born in London in 1874 the youngest of three children of Kathleen and her husband Peter Penn-Gaskell. Winifred moved to Scorbitor, according to electoral records in 1930, and she lived at the farm until her death in 1949.

Winifred's claim to fame was her collection of aeronautical memorabilia which included a collection of stamps charting the rise of airmail postage service throughout the world. Winifred exhibited her collection of stamps at many exhibitions throughout Europe. In one competition in 1931 in Hamburg, it won a gold plaquette, the prize, most appropriately won, was a free trip on the famous airship the "Graf Zepplin".

Over the years the stamp collection grew in importance as a historical record and in 1938 Winifred was added to the "Roll of Distinguished Philatelists". She was the first woman to be accorded this honour.

Her collection had grown to such prominence and importance she had to decide how she would I make it available to future generations.

Originally, she offered it to the Victoria and Albert Museum but her offer was declined, however an offer to the Science Museum was accepted. A small part of Miss Penn-Gaskell's collection is on display in the museum in South Kensington whilst the greater proportion is in the museum's storage.

This is part of the story of the Penn-Gaskell family and other interesting parts will be told in the coming months.



Roadside hedge and tree management

Who is responsible for their maintenance?

Many hedges and trees grow on the edge of the highway and mark its boundary with private property. In such cases it is the responsibility of the adjacent landowner or occupier to properly maintain them. This also applies to trees that overhang the highway or those which may fall on to it.

Legal Requirements for Maintenance

The Highways Act 1980 (Section 154) empowers the County Council, as the Highway Authority, to protect the safety of highways users by ensuring that owners and occupiers carry out their legal duties in respect of roadside hedges and trees.

Owners and occupiers are required to:

- Trim hedges and trees to ensure growth does not obscure the view of road signs
- Trim roadside hedges to maintain visibility for road users, particularly at junctions and on the inside of bends
- Trim and hedge that directly abuts a road, footway, cycleway or public right of way so that growth does not prevent the passage or affect the safety of the highway user, including cyclists and pedestrians.
- Remove dead or decaying trees and other growth that may fall across the highway.
- Remove branches and other growth that may prevent the passage of high sided vehicles or obstruct light from a public lamp (street light).
- Ensure the highway (including the footway and drainage features) is left clear of debris from the cutting operations (Section 148, Highways Act 1980)

Who undertakes the work?

It is easier for all concerned if landowners/occupiers maintain their own trees and hedges to a good standard.

What if the landowners/occupier fails to undertake work?

The County Council makes every effort to encourage owners and occupiers to cut their hedges, and will work closely with Parish Councils and local people to identify occupiers who neglect this work and to remind them of their responsibilities. Where roadside growth is becoming a problem the County Council may serve a notice on the owner/occupier requiring the necessary work to be completed within a stated period. Failure to comply may result in the Council undertaking the work and claiming back the cost incurred.

But..... didn't the children have a wonderful time on the top of Corndon! We had a couple with asthema who had to be gently encouraged up the hill,



carefully ensuring a rate suitable to the ability of their lungs. One wee lass very determinedly said, 'I can do it. No I can't! Yes I can', slowly and carefully she picked her way between the gorse and rocks. The other needed something of a push every now and again. Definitely, high rise flats and two years indoors has not helped these poor kids who should have been

running wild in fields or hills. In the end...... well...... They came back with mud war paint and black, proper bog water splattered mud over every single one of them. Tee hee hee..... poor washing machine was not too happy, but the children had a brilliant time!

We have one very kind donor who is paying for some of these groups, to

Young people who know nothing else have no mental escape and have a tunnel vision of the world – a tunnel of hard cement and fear of gangs and violence.

On the last day's evaluation we complete written forms, but the best is to capture the words.



James: 'Oh, I am definitely going to go out more! And I will stop my Dad smoking in the house. This place just smells fresh.' Samina: 'I didn't know I could walk up

a hill. We don't have any in Bristol. Can I come back and practice?'. Monie: 'I love you all. I'm going to cry and please can I take Mini home?' Tash: 'The nasty chicken did peck me, but it's OK. I forgive her.' One boy just looked me in the face and shook his head. Tears welled up. He was the biggest lad, problems at home. 'You can come back any time. Call us if you need to talk. You can talk about anything. You can always come back, any time, even when you are in your 80s and as grey as me!' He just looked at me, straight into my eyes and nodded. We are 'home', we provide a safe and warm space. We cannot be everything to everyone, but for a few, we can make a difference.

Co-option of new Councillor - Mr Mark Williams was welcomed onto the Council.

Recruitment of new Parish Clerk – Miss Jackie Bennetts attended the meeting as an observer and was formally introduced to the Council. She will take up the position on the 4th January. Her contact details can be found below.

Princetown Parking Issues – More frequent visits from Civil Enforcement Officers (CEO) have been requested regarding the restricted parking area outside the Post Office and shops, and the yellow lines outside the school. Cllr Stones reported that the CEO had been seen in the village on the morning on the 14th Dec.

Fundraising for St Michael's Churchyard – A paying in book has been placed in the Princetown Post Office for anyone wishing to make a contribution to the cost of maintaining the churchyard. A poster will be placed in the porch of St. Michaels alerting the public this, should they wish to make a donation.

Jubilee Celebrations – Souvenir mugs were the preferred gift for children and young people within the Parish, as discussed with other local bodies involved with planning local celebrations.

Climate Change declaration - Monitoring of the energy consumption/load is currently taking place at the Postbridge Visitor Centre to assess if it is possible to accommodate an Electric Vehicle Charging point. It is hoped that this may be in place for the next visitor season.

Vision Zero South West Partnership – The Council has been successful in applying for a grant of £6306, for the purpose of various road protection measures. These may include reflective cattle collars, improved signage and a new Vehicle Activated Sign (VAS) for Leedon Tor car park. A sub-committee will be formed, to include other stakeholders to take these actions forward.
