

The Parish Letter

Give it up for Comic Relief!

On Red Nose Day this year, 18th March, we will hear amazing stories of projects that have changed lives and communities. Started in 1985, Richard Curtis and Lenny Henry organised it in response to the famine in Ethiopia and inspired by Band Aid's fundraising efforts. For those who saw the concert, who could forget Bob Geldof shouting into the camera at viewers to 'Put your hand in your pocket and give us your XXXXXXX money!'? Since then, hundreds of millions of pounds have been raised for thousands of projects covering 70 nations world- wide. The genius of the movement, for me, has been the way Comic Relief has encouraged participation. It's not just about giving money; it's about getting involved. Lenny said: 'The spirit of Red Nose Day is for everyone to get involved...of helping someone else they don't know...what could be better than that?'

Some may say this is trivialising the serious challenges being faced today. People living in abject poverty, destitution or in fear is no laughing matter. But this is to miss the point. Comics take their work seriously. It is their livelihood and they are using the gifts they have been given to make a difference.

I can't help feeling that we have much to learn here as a Church. We, too, have a vision for a transformed world – indeed its God's vision of the Kingdom. We, too, want to see lives and communities changed for the better. Sometimes people are reluctant to become involved in a church project because they don't feel they are up to it or lack the expertise. Others will hesitate saying, 'who am I to be involved? Don't I need to be changed before I get started? Jesus, however, called his disciples to follow him before they understood everything; and he commissioned them for Kingdom work before they knew much more. He didn't wait for them to be fully ready before sending them out. If he had done that, Jesus's mission would never have got off the ground. The fascinating thing is that the disciples met God at work as they went out. They saw the mighty works of God as they offered their own seemingly insignificant talent and effort. They learnt on the hoof.

Of course, there is still plenty of work to be done in us and I am painfully aware that I am work in progress. I want to say: 'Change the world and start with me' but I am tempted, like Gerard Hughes, to say: 'Lord, I know you can change the world but

As visitors to the church will have seen, a great deal of work has been going on in the churchyards. David Best has done a wonderful job on the hedge between the two churchyards. The PCC is very grateful to him and to the various helpers who have cleared the debris away.

On the 5th of February, a working party comprising PCC members and willing volunteers from the village, spent three hours weeding, raking and trimming in the old churchyard and up the steps. Despite the various aches and pains experienced by some of us the next day, it was an enjoyable event fuelled by tea and cake from Tom and Tina's café. Further work was done later in the month round one of the old yew trees to finish clearing weeds and plant bulbs and wildflowers under the tree.

By the time this magazine is published, work on the other hedges should be completed. Spring flowers are starting to appear, and the new cherry trees will soon be in bud. The apple tree was given a good prune, so we might even see apples on it this year.

A step was also taken towards the work on and in the church building. A meeting of the various contractors, PCC members and our Church Architect took place last month and plans are in place for the work to begin. Subject to the permission being granted, a start date around the last week in June is anticipated.

The work will mean that there will be scaffolding outside the church for several weeks and the church will be closed for approximately four months. There should be little inconvenience for our immediate neighbours and those who use the paths through the churchyard, but more details will be provided nearer the time.

The Joy of Lent

I grew up with the idea that Lent was a dreary time in the Church calendar, the sermons talked only of repentance, there were no flowers to brighten up the church, and, worse still, we had to give up something we enjoyed — as a child it was usually sweets or chocolate!



However, if you ever decide to look at the traditions of Lent, it is then that certainly my, and possibly your, childhood notions may be shattered. It is actually meant to be a time of joyful preparation. I had never appreciated, perhaps I should have realised this years ago, but as is often the case, our lives and beliefs are so often shaped by our childhood memories.

The work of Father Norman Tanner, SJ, a professor of church history at the Pontifical Gregorian University in Rome which was founded in 1551 by Ignatius of Loyola is very revealing. In 1961, Fr Norman became a Jesuit — a Roman Catholic order of religious men that was also founded by St Ignatius. He is considered to be a leading expert in the history of church councils — one of his papers that makes interesting reading, 'A Short History of Lent' is online at:

Fr Norman explains that the earliest mention of Lent in the history of the Church comes from the council of Nicaea in 325AD. The original word used for the 40 days before Easter was tessarakonta a Greek word meaning 40 and around the world this has been translated in a



variety of ways. In Anglo-Saxon England, the 40 days became known as Lent, a word that aptly meant 'lengthening' — during the 40 days before Easter the daylight hours steadily lengthen and so gives us the perfect image of 'the light of Christ' slowly spreading into the world and erupting in a glorious climax on Easter morning.

Whatever it is called, the 40 days reflect the time Jesus spent in the wilderness being tested by the devil prior to his baptism and ministry on Earth. It is mirrored by the 40 'joyful' days of Advent as we prepare for the Christmas festivities, on which point, Fr Norman writes:

'It is important to remember that Lent is a joyful season. The first Preface for the Mass in Lent makes the point very elegantly: 'Each year you give us this joyful season when we prepare to celebrate the paschal mystery with mind and heart renewed. You give us a spirit of loving reverence for you, our Father, and of willing service to our neighbour. As we recall the great events that gave us a new life in Christ, you bring to perfection within us the image of your Son.'

All Christian denominations observe Lent with different traditions, and often individual churches of the same denomination have their own ways of marking the 40 days.

Hopefully this year the joy of Lent will be enhanced by the joy of returning to some of our Lenten traditions that we have all missed during the long Covid pandemic - and now its 'aftermath'.

P.S. Why not enjoy a Cream Tea at St Raphael's, (Sunday March 6th from 2.30pm to 4.30pm - see poster on page 15 for further details), before you perhaps give up sweeties and chocolates! But you may have to 'cheat a bit' - because Lent starts on Ash Wednesday this year on the 2nd March!





More Penn-Gaskells



Coat of Arms of Sir William Penn

Following on from last month's article regarding Winifred Penn-Gaskell, who was a resident of Widecombe parish from 1920 until 1949 I have now traced her family tree considerably further back and have discovered other interesting facts about the Penn-Gaskells.

In England between 1642 and 1651 a bitter civil war had been fought; King Charles I had been executed by the Parliamentarians who

had seized power. During this period the Penn family were given land and a castle in Ireland, (Shanagarry Castle in Co Cork), by Oliver Cromwell in recognition of services to England. Many of Winifred's forebears were born at Shanagarry Castle in Ireland.

In 1660 the "restoration of the monarchy" took place and the Penn family were also recognized for their support of the country by King Charles II. The King owed the Penn family a considerable amount of money but instead of repaying the debt in cash, the King gave Sir William Penn extensive lands in America. When Sir William died in 1670 the US land was inherited by his son William.

William (the son) as a young man had converted to the Quaker religion which was illegal in Britain since any person who was not part of the Church of England was persecuted as a religious dissenter. Penn was jailed on numerous occasions whilst maintaining his fight for religious toleration. After his fathers' death land in the United States passed to William. This enabled him to start his own colony where Quakers could practice their religion freely. The colony was called **Pennsylvania**, meaning "Penn' Woods", a name insisted upon by King Charles II.

The family name changed from Penn to Penn-Gaskell in 1761 when Christiana Penn married Peter Gaskell in St Pancras Church in Middlesex.

Admiral William Penn was Winifred's eight times great grandfather and Peter Penn Gaskell four times great grandfather.

My research has provided me with information about Winifred's two brothers, William and Percy, who were both commemorated in St Pancras Church in Widecombe. I will round off the Penn-Gaskell story next month.





Extracts from the meeting on 25th January 2022

Housing Needs Survey - Alex Rehaag (West Devon Borough Council) gave a short presentation on the Housing Needs Survey (HNS) which will be undertaken in the next few months. She clarified the purpose of this HNS is to establish a need for additional affordable housing within Princetown and asked for the Council's support in publicising it and encouraging residents to complete it. Cllr. Byrom explained it is important for the primary school that residents complete the survey as additional affordable housing would help to secure numbers of children attending the school, and therefore help future proof the community. Several Cllrs. raised the issue that the survey should not just be focussed on housing need within Princetown, as the Council covers a large rural area with smaller villages of Hexworthy and Postbridge. These have different and distinct housing needs that would not necessarily be reflected in the survey as currently worded. It was noted that although there are a small number of potential respondents within these areas, there remains a potentially unmet housing need. Alex Rehaag has taken the Councils feedback and will consider making amendments to reflect this. The Council are keen to encourage all residents to complete the survey once published.

Speedwatch - Cllr. Manning requested that Dartmoor Speedwatch, which he started in 2016 and has managed since then, be adopted as a Parish Council initiative. Council voted to adopt the initiative. It is hoped that this will help with any future opportunity to access funding for speed reduction resources and will increase the legitimacy of Speedwatch within the parish. Cllr. Manning will continue to organise it under the umbrella of the Council.

Sitka Spruce Plantation – It was agreed that the Council will facilitate a public meeting, outside of its normal monthly meetings, to enable residents to raise their concerns directly with the Duchy regarding the proposed felling of the trees near Bellever Close, Princetown. Cllr. Geen will be contacting The Duchy to identify a suitable date for the meeting, which is expected to take place in the next few months. The Council is keen to ensure that all residents are informed of the meeting, and so will be publicising the date and time on the parish notice board, website and Facebook page, once it has been agreed.

CCTV Princetown - A faulty camera has been replaced and a UPS (Uninterruptible Power Supply) fitted within the system to prevent further damage from electrical spikes, outages or lighting strikes.

Play Park Equipment & Lighting - A replacement seat has been obtained and fitted to the Zip Wire. The feasibility of lighting some areas of the Play Park is also being investigated.

Princetown Parking Issues - Parking continues to be an issue all year round, and is worse at weekends. Key areas of concern are: parking on double yellow lines outside the Fish & Chip shop, parking for longer than permitted time outside the Post Office, and parking in residential streets rather than in DNP carpark where there is a parking fee. Council agreed that this issue needed to be reported regularly in order to attract more visits from CEO.

News from the East Shallowford Trust

We had a bit of a debate this week as we plan for the next group in which we have a high level of obesity. A quick google will tell you that in 2016, 39% of adults aged 18 years and over (39% of men and 40% of women) were overweight. Overall, about 13% of the world's adult population (11% of men and 15% of women) were obese in 2016. The worldwide prevalence of obesity nearly tripled between 1975 and 2016 and now is responsible for the age of death in the UK actually declining!! Hunger however, after steadily declining for a decade, is on the rise, affecting 9.9% of people globally. From 2019 to 2020, the number of undernourished people grew by as many as 161 million, a crisis driven largely by conflict, climate change, and the COVID-19 pandemic.

Hmm – so, generally the statistics are positive globally, but some is negative for us Brits. How do we translate this into social responsibility and behaviour change at an individual level? Well, the worst news is that our cheerful weather forecast states that it is going to rain and rain next week. Hard to encourage a group to climb up Corndon, to get the lungs pumping, the arms and legs striding or out on a night walk when there are only drops of rain to splatter in your eyes instead of wonderful sparkling stars!

Most of the girls who are coming have plucked chickens with us, know how to prepare a meal, but are addicted to sugar or perhaps more accurately, a need to 'give themselves a little treat' in lives which are complicated, often emotionally stressed, insecure and without loving boundaries and positive role models.

According to Hans Herren of the Millennium Institute, globally we produce enough food to feed 14 billion people (the global population is around 7.8 billion), but of course it depends how that food is used and how much is wasted.

So, we have more than enough food, but are biologically and emotionally wired to stuff ourselves silly and damage our bodies! The girls who are coming know the routine. We weigh all the food at the end of every meal, write it in our book and enter the group into the competition – who wastes the least by the end of the year? The aim being to eat the healthy food on your plate and not expensive, sugar-coated snacks that the teenagers hide and sneak into their rooms.

We have had one group in 2021 who didn't waste a single thing. Great team game.....

works brilliantly with younger groups, not quite so successfully with the teenagers.



Everyone is asked to 'not put on their plate any more than they can eat', so we ask before we scoop out an amount, BUT everyone has to try a little bit of everything. You should see how many children hate the sweetest of peas, or whose parents clearly provide only chips and crisps. How the human body survives is a mystery (I could tell you about someone I worked with who

only ate Mars Bars...... But it has a sad ending!). We do the little where we can and we know a few children who have crossed the barrier into eating their first orange, a bite of an apple or one who dared to eat two whole green beans – albeit smothered in mashed potato!

The question is...... will we secure a little more leverage when our vege patch is producing real food that can be plucked from a branch or gently tugged from damp soil? Well, the boys have been building!





We just hope that by being consistent, showing care, support, providing alternatives to some of the negatives, that we can open new doors or perhaps different paths which lead to better choices. The mother of the lad who, after much whooping and encouragement from his mates ate a plate full of beans on his last day, did send us a message, 'He ate an APPLE!' she wrote! Made us all smile!
